[Arrangement of 1870.]

State of Kentucky
Clark County Oct. 3

On this 3d day of October 1838 personally appeared
and in open Court before Justices, Gabriel Barber Warfey
and William C. Lupton Justices composing the County Court
for the County of Clark in the State of Kentucky, John
Hundley a resident of County and State aged about forty
years who being first duly sworn according to law did say
and make the following declaration, in order to obtain the
benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress passed
the 1st of March 1832, - that he enlisted in the army of the United
States, but from the great lapse of time and his advanced
age he cannot now remember what year but he
states that he was in the spring of the year preceding
during that in which the battle of Jemison was
fought. - Now can he now recollect the number of the regi-
ment which he states belonged to the Virginia Line in
which he served, under the following named officers
that he resided in the County of Hanover & State of Vir-
ginia when he entered the Service, that he enlisted and
went out under Captain Charles Barber, Lieutenant Rich-
ard Cliff Anderson, the name of the company he does not
now recollect and that he was the orderly sergeant
of this Company. This man Richard was colonel
and - Muhlenburg General, that the company was
enlisted in the County of Hanover whence they marched
to Williamsburg, where they joined General La Fayette
that after he arrived at Williamsburg Capt. Barber's
Company (the one to which he belonged) was sent down
whether the bloddy clowm to Kemp's Landing on James
River to oppose the British who were camping up the
river in their small vessels called ten-dos - that
the day before he arrived the British were repelled
in a fight by the troops - then that he and
the whole of Capt. Barber's Company remained at
Kemp's Landing four or five months, that from
thence they returned to Williamsburg and after
remaining there about three months he then marched
back to Hanover Courthouse to meet the British
who were then committing great depredations in
that quarter - that some time after he returned to
Hanover Courthouse the British having abandoned
that neighbourhood, he received a written discharge
from Capt. Barber which he has ever since lost.

He states that he was in the service during this engagement as orderly sergeant ~~at least~~ one year.
He further states that in about two weeks after he was discharged by Capt. Habue, he was sent for by Genl. Marquis de La Fayette, by a special messenger, to ride upon express—that he immediately joined La Fayette, and was charged with counteracting the small acts of Virginia to New Counties, that he was sent by General La Fayette upon an express with letters to General Greene who was then in the South that while performing his duty he was taken prisoner by Col. Tarlton & his Corps, about twenty miles from Richmond in Virginia, by whom he was robbed of his papers and dispatches &c, and then taken to Richmond thence to Williamsburg at which new place he was confined in close jail two days thence to Jamestown, where on the night of the battle at that place he was exchanged, that as soon as he received of the small pock which he took while ^{from} the British, he joined La Fayette again and continued to ride express, carrying dispatches to various parts of the United States, in which he was constantly engaged for ~~more than~~ one year and until about two weeks before the close of the war—for all of which services he has never ^{that he knows of} been rewarded by whom he can prove his services he served Maj. Compton about the valuable ^{to a heavy sum} property, with claim whatever to compensation as can only except the present and he declares that his name is not on the pension roll of any agency in any state.

I now send you late notice for this to be my last effort and—

He states that he was born in the County of Hanover
and State of Virginia in the year 1763—that he had
no record of his age; that he lived in Hanover
County Virginia when called into service, that he lived
in Hanover County Virginia two years after the close
of the revolutionary war from thence he moved
to Blkies County Georgia, where he lived about
two years at thence moved to Kentucky where he
was born ^{when he moved} ~~resided~~ ^{now resides} that he enlisted in the Regt
in the Virginia State line—and that Capt
Charles Keatney Richard Cliff a Briton son Lieutenant
who was above named and Captain of the regular
officer who was with the troops which he served
he does not recollect the ^{number} Continental or militia regt
men with which he was a member—that he recollects
one written discharge from Capt Keatney which
he has lost—he states that he is well known by
Jack Foyor, William Galwood, and others etc,
~~who can testify~~ who resided in his present neighborhood
who can testify to his character for
honesty and the belief of his services as
a soldier of the revolution—the party below
names every claim whatever to a pension or any
pension except the present—and declares that he
named is ~~not~~ ^{not} on the pension roll of the govern-
ment of Army State.


