For the purpose of obtaining the Benefits of the Acts en-  
tituled an "act for the Relief of Certain Surviving Officers  
and Soldiers of the Army of the Revolution" approved on the  
15<sup>th</sup> day of May 1828 I David Love of the County of Oldham  
in the State of Kentucky do hereby declare that I enlisted  
in the Continental Line of the Army of the Revolution for  
and during the War and continued in its Service  
untill its Termination at which Period I was a Sergeant  
in Captain Clinkett's Company. I first enlisted in  
Captain Morrison's Company Colonel Gumbert's Regiment  
of the Maryland Line I served to the South and after  
the Battle of the Eutaw Springs I was furloughed and  
went into Fredericktown in Maryland where I joined  
Captain Clinkett's Company which Belonged to a  
Detachment Commanded by Major Stansdale  
and at the close of the War I was discharged in  
Baltimore my discharge has long since been lost  
I also declare that I afterwards received an Act of  
for the Reward of eighty dollars to which I was entitled  
under a Resolution of Congress passed the 15<sup>th</sup> of May 1778

And I further declare that I was not on the 15<sup>th</sup>  
of May 1828 on the Pension List of the United States

in the State of Kentucky. Personally appeared this 28 day  
of June 1828 John Mounts and Thomas Berry  
Citizens of the said County who did severally make  
Oath that they have known David Love by  
whom the foregoing Declaration was subscribed  
for upwards of Twenty years has always and  
is generally reputed and believed to have been  
a Soldier in the Army of the Revolution in manner

I, Brent Hopkins, Clerk of the Court of Oldham County, holden at La Grange in and for the County aforesaid, do hereby certify that satisfactory evidence has been exhibited to said Court that David Love was a pensioner of the United States at the rate of 120 Dollars per annum under act of Congress of the 15<sup>th</sup> of May 1828. was a resident of the County of Oldham in the State of Kentucky and died in the County of Oldham in the State of Kentucky in the year 1830 on the 6<sup>th</sup> day of December that he left a widow whose name was Nancy Love and the following named children Joseph John Schaefer and David Love.

That said widow has since died to wit on the 5<sup>th</sup> day of July 1836. that before the said David Love departed this life he made his last will and testament which last will and testament was on the 20<sup>th</sup> day of June 1831 duly and legally admitted to record in the Office of the Clerk of the Oldham County Court by order of said County Court of Oldham County at its June Term holden at West Port in and for said County on the 20<sup>th</sup> day of June 1831.

And it is now further certified that said last will and testament of David Love is in the words and figures following to wit the above named David Love child as aforesaid was named as executor of said last will and testament.

In the name of God Amen, I David Love, being in bad health but of sound mind and memory and being sensible of the uncertainty of this life, do hereby make this my last will, hereby revoking all others by me made. In the first place my will and desire is that all my just debts be paid. Item I give to my son Joseph Love the tract of land whereon he now resides, as laid off to him, estimated at one hundred and upwards be the same more or less, to him and his heirs

for ever. I give to my son John Love One  
hundred and eighty acres, whereon he now  
lives, to be laid off on William Taylor's line  
to begin at Joseph Lovi's Corner in said Taylor's  
line and to run an equal distance upon  
Joseph Lovi's line and Burton's line so that a  
line parallel to said Taylor's line will  
give the quantity to him and his heirs for ever.  
The balance of the tract of land on which  
I now reside, together with all my other  
worldly goods that I have at this time, or may  
be possessed of at my death, if my wife Agnes  
should outlive me, I give her the use of it  
during her natural life, and at her death  
I give and bequeath the same to my son  
David Love Junr, who it is my wish shall take  
care of his mother and manage the planta-  
-tion. I give to her a comfortable support  
from the proceeds of my estate and after  
her death, my said son David Love Junr  
is to possess and enjoy the said estate to  
him and his heirs for ever. I do hereby appoint  
my son David Love Junr my sole Executor to  
my last Will & my request is that he is to give  
no security, such. In witness whereof,  
I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my  
seal this 16<sup>th</sup> day of August 1822.

The last Will and Testament of David Love  
decd, was produced in Court and proved to be  
such by the oath of William Taylor a

Be it known that before me, Gabe Knightley  
Presiding Judge of the County Court <sup>duly authorized</sup>  
by law to administer oaths in and for the county aforesaid, personally  
appeared David Love <sup>and made oath in</sup>  
due form of law that he is the executor of David Love deceased  
the identical person who was a Revolutionary pensioner and is  
now dead, and to whom a certificate of pension was issued under  
the act of May 15<sup>th</sup> 1828 payable at the Lexington Kentucky  
agency. Said certificate of pension <sup>was assigned to the department which assigned it to me</sup> has been lost, and after  
due search and inquiry therefor it cannot be found. This affiant  
says he does not know by whom he can prove the entire service  
rendered the U.S. by said Love during the Revolution. Said David  
Love, deceased, was an orderly sergeant in the first Regiment Maryland  
line, and this affiant believes that full proofs of said Love's services  
was furnished at the time said pension was granted said Love  
under the aforesaid act of May the 15<sup>th</sup> 1828 and is as he verily  
believes now in the department at Washington City, he admits  
said proof and makes it a part of this affidavit. This affiant  
further says that said Love never in his lifetime, nor has any  
one for or in right of him drawn any pension money, except  
the amount allowed him under the aforesaid act of May 15<sup>th</sup>  
1828. The object of this application is to procure the pension  
money that was coming to said Love under the resolve of the 21<sup>st</sup>  
of October 1850 that he has never been removed or superseded, nor has  
ever resigned, but still remains the executor of said David Love  
deceased. That the deceased pensioner resided in Oldham County  
Kentucky for the space of six years before his death, and  
that previous thereto he resided in Shelby County Kentucky  
of the truth of which statements I am fully satisfied  
I do hereby certify this 21<sup>st</sup> day of April 1856.
