On the 21st day of September 1832 personally appeared in open Court before the ^{County} Court of Oldham County in the State aforesaid now sitting John Morgan of the County of Oldham and State aforesaid aged about 70 years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed the 7th of June 1832

That he entered the service of the United States in the year 1780 in Dorchester County Maryland where he at that time did. He entered then the militia first as a volunteer, for nine months and served in Capt. Bartholomew Reynolds Company, which Company after some time was commanded by Capt. Joseph Nathan, after Capt. Reynolds was promoted, and he served nearly if not the whole of the nine months - He served the Army under General Hooper, a few minutes after the battle at Pointe du Jour at Brown's Iron - At another time he was drafted in the Maryland Militia and served in Capt. Stapletons Company about one month to guard the country against the British Refugees. He was in no battle - He was marched through several parts of the State of Maryland but does not recollect of being marched out of that State.

He was born on the 22nd of September 1761 in St. Marys County in the State of Maryland - A record of his birth kept by his father, was in the hands of his twin brother Thomas Morgan until within a few years but he understands the said record has been lost. He removed when young from Saint Marys County, to Dorchester County in same State from which County he entered the said Service - In this County he resided until about 35 years ago when he removed to Kentucky, & has ever since continued to reside in said State and within a few miles of his present residence. He was acquainted with Col. Eggleston, & General Hooper of the regular Army - and also with the said Capt. Reynolds & Nathan - whom he thinks were promoted in the regular Service - He has no recollection of acquaintance with any other regular officers -

He knows of no person in existence except his said Mother
Thomas by whom he can prove any part of his said service,
and has no documentary evidence of his service. He thinks
his discharges were merely verbal.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or
immunity except the present, and declares that his name is not
on the Pension Roll of the agency of any State.


We Elijah Gates a Clergyman residing in the County

same is a resident in the same County, and is a credible
person, and that their statement is entitled to credit.

Dear Sir:

The data contained herein are obtained from the papers on file in the Revolutionary War claim for pension, S.1238, based upon the military service of John Morgan in that war.

John Morgan was born September 22, 1761 in St. Marys County, Maryland, and when young moved to Dorchester County, Maryland. The names of his parents are not shown.

While a resident of Dorchester County, Maryland, John Morgan enlisted in 1780, and served about nine months as private in Captains Bartholomew Ennold's and Joseph Dathem's Maryland Companies. He enlisted, date not stated, and served about one month as private in Captain Staplefoot's Maryland Company.

About 1799 he moved from Dorchester County, Maryland, to Kentucky.

He was allowed pension on his application executed September 21, 1832, at which time he was a resident of Oldham County, Kentucky.

He died July 1, 1840, place not stated. *On A.B.*

Soldier's twin brother, Thomas Morgan, was living in 1832, his residence not shown. There are no further family data.
