



For the purpose of obtaining the Benefits of the Act entitled  
"an Act for the Relief of Certain surviving Officers and  
Soldiers of the Army of the Revolution approved on the  
15<sup>th</sup> day of May 1828 I Peter Bouthouse of the  
County of Oldham in the State of Kentucky do hereby  
declare that I enlisted in the Continental Line of the Army  
of the Revolution for and during the War and continued  
in its Service until its Termination at which period  
I was a Private in Captain Gasways Company I  
enlisted in Captain Beathes Company the Seventh  
Maryland Regiment Commanded by Colonel  
Gentry Captain Beathes was killed at the Battle  
of Camden after the Battle of the Earleau Springs  
I returned to Andersonstown in Maryland with Lieu-  
tenant Benjamin Fickle on the circuiting Service  
and was assigned to Captain Gasways Company  
who Belonged to a Detachment Commanded by  
Major Hardman at which place I was discharged  
which discharge I have long since lost

and I also declare that I afterwards received  
Certificates for the Reward of eighty dollars to which  
I was entitled under a Resolve of Congress passed  
the 15<sup>th</sup> of May 1798

And I further declare that I  
was not on the 15<sup>th</sup> of May 1828 on the Pension List  
of the United States No one's way hand this 28 June 1828

My dear Mr. Simmons:

In reply to your letter of the 23rd instant, I have the honor to advise you that this bureau is unable to furnish the history of a soldier of the Revolution unless a claim for pension or bounty land has been made on account of his services. A search of the records fails to show such a claim on file on account of the services of any soldier named Israel Outhouse.

You are herewith furnished the history of Peter Outhouse, the only soldier of that name found on the Revolutionary War records of this bureau.

From the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, S. 46400, it appears that Peter Outhouse enlisted, date not stated, and served as a private in Captain Beatty's Company, Colonel Gunby's Seventh Maryland Regiment; in the fall of 1781, he was placed in Captain Gassaway's Company under Major Hardman, and was discharged

at Fredericktown, Maryland, at the close of the war.

He was allowed pension on his application executed  
~~June 23, 1823, at which time he was living in Oldham~~  
County, Kentucky. His age is not given and there are  
no data as to family.
