On this 20th day of August 1832 personally
appeared before the County Court of the County of Oldham

John Reed a Resident of the County of Oldham
and State of Kentucky, aged seventy five years,
who being first duly sworn according to law,
doth on his oath, make the following declaration
in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made
by the act of Congress passed June 7th 1832

That he enlisted in the Army of the United States
from the best of his Recollections in the year 1775
with Captain Richard Taylor, and served in the
first Virginia Regiment of the Continental Line
under the following named officers:

Colonel John Greene Major Croghan & Captain
Richard Taylor, that he enlisted for two years
and was in the Battle at Long Bridge near Norfolk,
and at the Battle of Brandy Wine, at the Siege at
Middletown Fort, and in a skirmish with the British
at Trenton, and that he received his discharge at
Valley Forge from Genl. Charles Scott.

and that shortly after his first enlistment expired
he enlisted in the Virginia State Troops under
Captain Jack Roberts, and the Regiment was
commanded by Colonel Frank Taylor, and that
he was kept most of his time employed to guard
the Prisoners surrendered by Genl. Burgoyne
and that after his second term expired he served
two months in the Militia of Virginia, as a substitute
for James Reed - and that he lived in Culpeper County,
Virginia when he enlisted.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension
or an annuity, except the present, and he declares his name
is not on the Pension Roll of any agency in any state
sworn to, and subscribed, the day and year aforesaid

I hereby certify that this day Herman Bowman Esq^r personally appeared before me Samuel Berry a Justice of the Peace in and for the said County and made the following statement as his deposition in behalf of John Reed of Oldham County. The said Dep^o saith that he is now in the sixty third year of his age and has been acquainted with the said John Reed ever since about the year 1790. The said Reed removed from Virginia in or about the said year 1790 and had married a Cousin of this Dep^o from which circumstance the Dep^o became intimate with him from that time and the Dep^o boarded with and resided with the said Reed all the Summer of the year 1791. And from his the Dep^o's first acquaintance with the said Reed he was reported by all his acquaintances that had removed from Virginia and they were known to have been a Soldier of the ^{American} Revolution, & as the Dep^o understood in the regular service for during the War. While the Dep^o resided with said Reed he then lived in Woodford County, in 1791 the Dep^o recollects that Thomas Lillard Esq^r now dead then of Mercer County, told this Dep^o that he in part of said War had been in the same Map with said Reed. The said Lillard for probity and personal credit was inferior to no man. Also Mr Robert Baker told the Dep^o he had been a mate with said Reed in the Revolutionary War as the Dep^o understood a part of the time of said War and the said Reed upon this Dep^o mentions what said Lillard & said Baker had said, told this Dep^o he had Map'd with both of them, in said War. This Dep^o further saith that in and about 1790 and 1791 and after ward

states, that for truth honesty and personal goodness the
Character of the said Reed has always been excellent
and so remains as this Dependent is informed and
believes; The said Reed is attested given under
