in this 20th day of ^{September} August 1832 personally appeared
in open court before the ^{District} county court of Oldham County in
the state of ^{the} said now sitting George Cuyler a resident
of the County and state of ^{the} said aged about 70 years
who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his
oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the
benefit of the act of Congress passed the 3rd of March 1802
That he entered the service of the United States in the year
1777 as a volunteer in Benjamin Harrison's Company of
Virginia Volunteers he entered the service in Faguer
County Virginia where he at the time resided, and where
he had been raised from a child having been born
in another ^{January 30th 1762} part of the same State - The company to which
he belonged and another company commanded by Capt
Saml Blackwell marched to join the regular army
and did serve the regular army under the command
of Col Thomas Marshall near Parkersburg in the
in Pennsylvanias ^{as a brigade commanded by General Washington} a few days after the battle of
Germantown having met the army returning from
this battle - in this town he served upwards of three
months, and on the regular army retiring to winter quarters
he was verbally discharged by his officers - In the year 1781
he at the same County joined Capt John Balls Company
of Virginia militia into which he was drafted - and
did another tour of three months in this country
he started from Faguer County ^{with} this company
and joined the regular army under Marquis La Fayette
and was attached to the regiment commanded by Col
Elias Edmonds - In this town he served part of his
time in the light infantry in a company also
commanded by Capt Ball - and in a regiment
commanded by Capt Matthews - he was permitted to
return home by his officers, as his term of service expired
and the company to which he belonged having been

relieved by another company - he had nothing more than a mere discharge - he continued to reside in the state of Virginia until about 36 years ago when he moved to Shelby county in Kentucky - where he resided until about 16 years ago when he removed to the place where he now lives -

He states that he has no documentary evidence of his service but believes he can prove part if not all of them by John Cook and James Holmes of Shelby county Kentucky -

He here by relinquishes every claim what ever to a pension or annuity in case the present court declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the army of any state -

We Elijah Galt a clergyman residing in the county of Boone and state of Kentucky and Thomas Morgan residing in the same county hereby certify that we are well acquainted with George Singer who has subscribed and sworn to the above declaration that we believe him to be about 70 years of age, that he is reputed and believed in the neighborhood where he resides to have been a soldier of the revolution - and that we concur in that opinion
