I, Richard M. MeCrack, Circuit Judge
in and for the fifth Judicial Dis-
trict of the Commonwealth of Ken-
tucky and sole Judge of the Circuit
Court in and for the County and Circuit
of Jefferson, in said District, do hereby
certify that on this day William Tay-
lor came before me and upon oath de-
clared that he is a citizen of the
United States and a Resident of the Coun-
ty of Jefferson aforesaid. That in the
Spring of the year 1776 he entered the
Army of the Revolution as a first Lieute-
nant in Captain Thomas' 2nd Co
Company in the second Virginia Reg-
iment of the Continental establishment
which Regiment was commanded by
Colonel William Woodford; In the
Spring of the year one thousand seven
hundred and eighty he was appointed
a Captain and ordered to take the Ninth
Virginia Regiment of the Continental
establishment then stationed at Pitts-
burg commanded by Colonel John
Gibson. That in the Spring of the year
one thousand seven hundred and eighty
one he (being then stationed at Wheel-
ing in Virginia) received a letter from
said Colonel John Gibson advising
him that he said William Taylor
had been left out of the service by an

arrangement made at Chesterfield
Court House in Virginia. That his com-
mission as Lieutenant as aforesaid
was issued and dated in the Spring
one thousand seven hundred and
seventy six, and that he continued in
the ~~same~~ military service of the United
States as before stated until the Spring
of the year one thousand seven hun-
dred and eighty one, when he quitted
the service in consequence of the ar-
rangements of the Legislature as
before mentioned, that he never was commis-
sioned as a major, but acted as such for a year
and a half, that his commissions as lieutenant
and captain since written upon paper, and
are worn out and no longer in existence, and
that from the services rendered by him
the assistance of his country for support.

Major John Harrison also swears and deposes
that he knew that the said William Taylor
was in the military service of his country during
the revolutionary war, as an officer upon the
continental establishment for about six years,
and that a part of that time, the said Taylor acted as
Major in the regiment to which the said Har-
rison belonged.

that in the winter of 1775-1776, he was appointed 1st Lt. in the Company
of Capt Francis Taylor, (his brother) attached to the 3^d Regiment of Virginia
Commanded by Col Woodford, in the Virginia Line, 1st Continental
establishment - that he was subsequently promoted to the rank of
Captain, and then to that of Major and continued in the army until
the year 1781 - and that he was afterwards, at the recreation of the
army arranged out of the service as a junior officer, at Chesterfield
Court-House, Virginia; that his name has been placed on the pension
list, and dropped therefrom on account of his property and in
pursuance of the act of 1st May 1820; I do solemnly swear
that I was a resident citizen of the United States on the 18th day of
March 1818 and that I have not since that time, by gift sale or
any other means disposed of _____ property, or any _____ thereof

with intent thereby so to do. It is, as to being myself within the provisions of an act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War" passed on the 18th day of March 1838, and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me, any property or securities, contracts or debts due to me, nor have I any income other than what is contained in the Schedule hereto annexed, and by me subscribed.

On this fifth day of August A.D. 1851 before the county court within and for the county and State aforesaid personally came Richard T. Taylor of said County who being duly sworn according to law upon his oath declares that he the said and one of the heirs at law of the late Major William Taylor who was an officer of the American Continental line in the war of the Revolution and of his wife Elizabeth Taylor now also deceased. He further states that his father secured the passage of the act of 15th May 1828 and secured a pension under said act until he died in oldham County Kentucky on the 29th day of March 1830 leaving the said Elizabeth Taylor his widow and that the said Elizabeth Taylor survived until the 29th day of March 1849 when she died leaving this declarant Richard T. Taylor Eleanor M. Berry and Eliza A. Horney her children and only surviving children. He further states that as he has always been informed and believes the said William Taylor was married to the said Elizabeth Taylor in the County of Jefferson and State of Kentucky on or about the 25th day of July 1796 and that the said Elizabeth Taylor never again married after the death of said William Taylor but remained his widow until her death. He makes this declaration for the purpose of obtaining the benefit of the act of Congress

He further stated on oath that his five youngest children before named are dependent on him and cannot contribute to their support in any beneficial degree and that he the said Taylor is infirm and inactive and with difficulty pursuing his occupation of farming and will not much longer be able to pursue it at all.

He further declared on oath that if he shall not recover the 194 acres of land mentioned in his schedule that he will not be able to own a home and will be actually ruined.

Dear Madam:

You are advised that it appears from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, W. 6233, that William Taylor, Senior, in the summer of 1775 was a minute man in Captain Spencer's Virginia company; in the winter of 1775 and 1776 was appointed first lieutenant in Captain Francis Taylor's (soldier's brother) company in Colonel William Woodford's Second Virginia regiment, and was a captain in the same company and regiment until the spring of 1780 when he was appointed major and served in Colonel John Gibson's Virginia regiment until the spring of 1781. He was in the battles of Long Bridge, Brandywine, Germantown and Monmouth.

He was allowed pension on his application executed May 1, 1818, at which time he was living in Jefferson County, Kentucky. In 1820 he was living in Louisville, Kentucky and was aged sixty-seven years.

He died March 29, 1830 in Oldham County, Kentucky.

He married July 25, 1796 in Jefferson County, Kentucky, Elizabeth or Eliza Courts.

She died March 29, 1849 in Henry County, Missouri.

Their children in 1820 were referred to as follows:-
Robert H. C., eighteen years of age. Eleanor Madison, aged fourteen years; Caroline Jefferson, aged twelve years; Louise Washington, aged nine years; Eliza Ormsby, aged five years and Richard W. Ferguson, aged four weeks.

The pension due their mother was allowed the following surviving children:- Richard F. Taylor, Eleanor M. Berry and Eliza O. Horning.

The above noted William Taylor is the only soldier of that name found on the Revolutionary War records of this bureau, who served as an officer with the Virginia troops.
